World Communion Sunday

In 1936, a group of pastors launched World-Wide Communion Day. Amid the Great Depression, they were looking for a way to meet people's spiritual needs and unite Christians in their dedication to Christ.

The observance, now known as World Communion Sunday, is held on the First Sunday of October. For eight decades, it has served as a reminder that Christians around the globe share the same meal in remembrance of Jesus.

Christmas Stocking Project Starts in October

Once again we will be preparing Christmas stockings for the children served by Metro Ministries in Brooklyn, New

York. Metro Ministries serves over 25,000 children each weekend with "on the street" Sunday schools as well as many other programs which bring God's hope and love to children of poverty and crime-ridden urban settings.

For most of these children the Christmas stocking you prepare will be their only Christmas gift. "The children are amazed that someone who never met them would send them a gift." The deadline to bring filled stockings to the church is Sunday, November 5. Beginning October 8 instructions for the stockings, along with some ready-to-fill stockings will be available at a special display in the church foyer. The

instruction sheet has the pattern for those who want to make their own stockings. Suggestions for what to put in the stockings include (but not limited to):

The Power of Slow

I was speaking with a pastor recently about message preparation and was explaining my peculiar way of preparing for a message. You see: I use an old-fashioned fountain pen. You know, the kind you have to fill up. It was a gift when I graduated from Seminary and I have used it ever since; and for good reason – it runs out of ink!

Fountain pens go through ink faster than your typical ballpoint or gel pen. Because of that, it's not uncommon for me to fill up my pen once or twice a day. And each time I have to fill up it forces me to stop what I am doing, take out the jar of ink and the paper towel I keep in the desk drawer, and go through the several minutes long process of refilling the chamber.

There's something else about a fountain pen – you have to write more slowly. Because of the shape of the tip you cannot simply pick it up and write – it takes more forethought than that. You need to be sure the pen is oriented correctly. You also need to be aware of your speed since going too slowly or quickly can affect the flow of ink. It really is quite a tedious process.

So then, why, would anyone in their right mind, choose a fountain pen? The answer is, BECAUSE it is slower. I have noticed something; using a fountain pen slows the entire process of my message preparation. It adds time and in a world bent on moving at the speed of light, slowing down is a nice change of pace.

In the Psalms we're told to "meditate" on the Word of God. One cannot meditate quickly. By definition meditation takes time. And I have noticed that extra time produces dividends of scriptural insight that would have been missed altogether had I sped through the passage as fast as those other writing instruments would allow.

Therein lies the lesson I have learned and I hope you will glean: take your time with the Bible. It is the world's most perfect and sacred piece of literature. It took more than 1,400 years to write using more than 40 authors and several languages. It has survived countless attacks from the unbelieving world and, has never been disproven and even though it's more than 2,000 years old, it still has the power to transform lives as if it were a new release.

The Bible is worth slowing down for. It is worth the extra time. There is nothing else in life that provides a person the kind of reward that meditating on God's Word provides the believer. Although the true number is incalculable, one could easily say an extra minute in Scripture is worth more than hours upon hours invested in any other pursuit.

Let me encourage you, whatever you're doing this week, to stop for a time and soak in some part of Scripture. My hope is you too will appreciate the value of slowing down through and meditating on the Bible. There is power in slow.

Please fill only the number of stockings which you can do in a nice way. Aim to get a mix of "sensible" and "fun" items for the child. Please avoid large items such as big coloring books, etc. Do not put in any "dark" items such as things decorated with skulls, witches, etc.

Decorating the stockings is a great way to make it more fun and exciting for the child receiving it. Just be sure your decorations are stitched or firmly glued to the felt. Please do not use "press-on" foam stickers. They do not stay on. NO GLITTER PLEASE!! Important! Nothing may stick out the top. The stockings MUST be able to be closed. Oversized items will be removed. Helpful hint: to save space trim cardboard packaging, or remove it totally if it does not carry instructions.
