Zion Choral to Present Concert

Zion Choral will perform in our sanctuary on Sunday, October 14 at 3:00 p.m. **Zion Choral** originated in 1929 as a male chorus under the

direction of J. Claude Harwick. Women were included a few years late. At first it was a combination of choirs. The name came from Harwick's church, Zion Hill Evangelical Lutheran Church, where he was the organist and choir director. The church is still their home base and the choir practices there weekly before the concert season begins.

Zion Choral has ministered in many churches in eastern Pennsylvania as well as Florida and New Jersey. Ensembles of Zion have also sung with the Christmas concerts of Andy Williams and Steve Green. Choir members range in age from teenagers to those in their 80s and are from all walks of life and many different denominations.

Please fill only the number of stockings which you can do in a nice way. Aim to get a mix of "sensible" and "fun" items for the child. Please avoid large items such as big coloring books, etc. Do not put in any "dark" items such as things decorated with skulls, witches, etc.

Decorating the stockings is a great way to make it more fun and exciting for the child receiving it. Just be sure your decorations are stitched or firmly glued to the felt. Please do not use "press-on" foam stickers. They do not stay on. **NO GLITTER PLEASE!! Important! Nothing may stick out the top. The stockings MUST be able to be closed. Oversized items will be removed.** Helpful hint: to save space trim cardboard packaging, or remove it totally if it does not carry instructions.
